Veteran Speaker Scott Liverett

November 2nd, 2018, Scott Liverett, a veteran, went to Louisville Middle School for veterans day and spoke to students about his experience in the military.

Students in Mr. Aljancics 8th grade math class gathered in the auditorium to listen to the speaker Scott Liverett. Scott Liverett told them about the time a violent explosion went off and he went flying in the air 30 yards away from where the explosion was. During the incident, Scott ended up getting severely injured with many broken bones.

Scott started off talking about being in a military vehicle with a couple of other soldiers as they were driving somewhere. Then Scott said that the vehicle went over a landmine and the landmine made a huge explosion which sent Scott flying out of the vehicle, landing 30 yards away.

Scott Liverett said, "When the medics found me my left leg was underneath my back. At the moment I didn't realize that was what had happened because the pain was so severe I couldn't even move. The bone in my leg was completely broken and it was only held together by the meat of my leg." Scott also told the students

the huge explosion and one of his friends was stuck half in and half out of the vehicle with it on top of him.

Scott said, "My friend died 20 seconds after the vehicle was lifted off of him." Scott Liverett was in the hospital for almost a year to recover from the injuries that he had. The first day he went in was December 12th and he got out the next year on November 1st. The injuries that Scott faced were life-changing, but he still made it home alive and relieved.
